Meeting Overview.

Dave gave an overview of the placemaking activities for downtown that will take place on Thursday, August 16th. These activities will support the design charrette and hopefully draw more people. A pre-event for businesses and organizations interested in hosting an event will be held on Wednesday, August 1st. Dave also informed the group that the location of the charrette has been confirmed: 206 Central Ave.

John explained that Ana Nelson has resigned from Perkins+Will and that Jay Demma will now be the project manager for Journey to 2040.

Using the Results of the Integrating Vision 2040 Joint Steering Committee Meeting:

Jay presented results from the June 21 Joint Steering Committee Meeting. Regarding the Vision 2040 exercise, Jay highlighted the key takeaways from the discussion and how they relate to the parks, trails, and open space in Faribault.

Jay also provided a brief overview of the continuum statements that related to parks and open space. John informed the group that <u>Perkins+Will will provide a goal summary that meshes the continuum statements with the</u>

Vision 2040 statements at the next meeting.

Overview of parks existing conditions and takeaways:

Jay presented background information on the City's existing park, trails, and open space. Bart noted that including the private facilities, public access lakes and county parks on the regional map would help provide a better context to the parks system. The group discussed the desire to make Faribault's parks a regional destination. The group also discussed camping needs for the community. Camp Faribault is a private facility and is at capacity. Regionally, many of the camping locations are cost prohibitive. Rice County Wilderness Nature Center is a top 10 free site for camping. Many go to lowa for less expensive camping options. *Perkins+Will will update the regional park map to reflect this discussion.*

Jay also presented the economic impact parks have in the state of Minnesota as well as some park acreage and budget data for the state in comparison to Faribault. The group discussed the findings that there is more park acreage per capita than average but less budget per capita than average. National trends in parks and recreation and demographics of Faribault were presented as well. There was a clarification on the household demographic data. The group discussed ways to improve the parks and improve livability to increase the population.

Overview of parks existing conditions and takeaways:


The group split into two smaller groups and performed a parks, trails, and open space mapping exercise. The activity's goal was to identify areas of opportunity, areas of concern, possible connections, and barriers in the park system. Attached are the results of the activity.

Overview of Strengths, Weakness, Opportunities, and Threats (SWOT) Exercise:

The group participated in a joint activity that aimed to identify the Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats (SWOT) to the parks, trails, and open space in Faribault. Collectively, they brainstormed lists for each of the four categories. After, they were asked to vote on their top two via an online survey. Seven anonymous people responded. What are the two biggest STRENGTHS for the parks, trails, and open space system in Faribault?





What are the two biggest OPPORTUNITIES for the parks, trails, and open space system in Faribault?


